



For many years now EFR's programs have allowed thousands of Canadians, in every province and territory of the country, to master critical primary (CPR), secondary (First Aid) infant care and AED knowledge and skills. These programs are allowed to be conducted all across Canada without geographical restriction (federal, provincial and territorial government approval is not necessary). This has always been the case.

Some workplaces have specific requirements whereby CPR and First Aid programs must be "approved" in order for a worker's CPR and First Aid training and certifications to be acknowledged or credited.

Emergency First Response® courses are approved for the workplace by the Federal Government of Canada (Canada Occupational Safety and Health). Transport Canada has granted EFR approval status for the Marine Basic First Aid Course. EFR courses are also recognized by Alberta for Workplace Health and Safety, and Newfoundland and Labrador's Workplace Health Safety and Compensation Commission (WHSCC).

Also, EFR courses meet the International Liaison Committee on Resuscitation (ILCOR) guidelines (consensus on resuscitation). ILCOR includes eight international resuscitation organizations: Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada, the American Heart Association, European Resuscitation Council, Resuscitation Council of Asia, Resuscitation Council of Southern Africa, the Australia and New Zealand Council on Resuscitation, and the InterAmerican Heart Foundation. ILCOR produced the first International CPR Guidelines and International Consensus on CPR and ECC Science with Treatment Recommendations. ILCOR is the world's guideline standard for CPR.
